RE: Opposition to Elimination of the Optional Adult Acupuncture Benefit in Medi-Cal

We, the undersigned, write to express our strong opposition to the Governor's 2025-26 May Revision proposal to eliminate acupuncture as an optional benefit under Medi-Cal (Issue 375). This proposal, detailed in the Department of Finance's Health and Human Services Budget Summary¹, would reduce General Fund expenditures by \$5.4 million in FY 2025-26 and \$13.1 million annually thereafter, threatening access to an essential, evidence-based health service

This is the second consecutive year this critical benefit has been targeted for elimination. Last year, thanks to the strong, bipartisan support of elected officials, stakeholders, and community advocates, acupuncture was preserved in the Medi-Cal program. We face the same challenge again this year and urge you to once again stand firm in protecting this vital service for thousands of Californians.

Acupuncture: A Proven, Cost-Effective Alternative in Addressing Pain and the Opioid Crisis Chronic pain affects nearly 20% of Americans, according to the 2024 NIH HEAL Initiative Annual Report², underscoring the vast need for effective pain management options. With nearly 110,000 Americans dying annually from drug overdoses—most involving opioids—the demand for non-pharmacological alternatives has never been greater. Acupuncture offers a low-risk, evidence-based treatment that has been shown to reduce opioid use and improve patient outcomes.

Recent studies reinforce acupuncture's efficacy:

- A 2024 study published in the *Annals of Internal Medicine* ³ found that 62% of patients receiving real acupuncture reduced their methadone dose by at least 20%, compared to 29% in the sham acupuncture group. This reduction is associated with a lower risk of addiction relapse.
- A 2024 meta-analysis ⁴ demonstrated that acupuncture significantly outperforms sham treatments in relieving pain and improving function in knee osteoarthritis.
- A 2024 umbrella review ⁵ confirmed acupuncture as a safe and effective therapy for low back pain, aligning with previous research advocating for its inclusion in mainstream pain management protocols.
- A large-scale 2023 individual patient data meta-analysis ⁶of over 20,000 patients with chronic conditions—including back and neck pain, osteoarthritis, chronic headache, and shoulder pain—showed significant and sustained improvements in pain and function.

History and Equity in Access

Acupuncture was reinstated as a Medi-Cal benefit on July 1, 2016, through Senate Bill 833, expanding access to low-income Californians who cannot afford out-of-pocket treatment. The California Acupuncture Board's 2022 Sunset Review Report indicates that while 81.8% of patients pay out of pocket for acupuncture, 9.3% depend on Medi-Cal coverage.

Importantly, this benefit was also threatened during last year's 2024-25 May Revision but was ultimately preserved due to strong bipartisan support from elected officials, community advocates, and healthcare stakeholders. This broad coalition recognized acupuncture as a vital component of equitable, holistic healthcare access. Removing this benefit again would disproportionately harm vulnerable populations, widening healthcare disparities and reversing hard-fought progress.

Transformative Whole-Person Care with Enduring Results

Acupuncture champions holistic healing by addressing the interconnected physical, mental, and emotional dimensions of wellness. Unlike treatments that focus solely on symptoms, acupuncture works by stimulating the body's natural energy pathways—known as meridians to restore balance and promote self-healing. This comprehensive approach not only alleviates pain and physical discomfort but also reduces stress, anxiety, and emotional tension, fostering

As a compelling alternative to pharmaceutical interventions, acupuncture provides hope and meaningful relief to countless patients—especially those seeking sustainable solutions beyond medication. This integrative therapy supports the body's innate ability to heal itself, paving the way for lasting health and improved quality of life.

Call to Action

The Administration's renewed attempt to eliminate acupuncture disregards its proven benefits, the progress made in opioid harm reduction, and the bipartisan support that protected this benefit last year.

Eliminating acupuncture as a Medi-Cal optional benefit would be a setback for public health, disproportionately impacting those with the fewest resources.

We urge the Legislature to reject the Governor's May Revision proposal to eliminate acupuncture as a Medi-Cal benefit and to preserve access to this essential service for Medi-Cal beneficiaries. Supporting acupuncture upholds California's commitment to holistic, equitable, and evidence-based healthcare for all.
